

The first annual Gala For The Gardens was held in downtown Des Moines on September 8th. The event, hosted at West End Architectural Salvage, was the inaugural fundraiser for the restoration of the Waterbury Gardens. Over 120 folks attended the evening event which included live music, hors d'oeurves, cocktails, desserts, and of course a silent auction. All neighbors enjoyed an evening of visiting, nibbling and bidding on their chosen treasures while enjoying the music of The Downtowners.

All who attended were treated to a rarity of actually having fun at a fundraiser. The great music, great food, and great people combined to make a night where every attendee had a smile on their face. It didn't hurt that attendees could explore each floor of West End Architectural Salvage while nibbling on a nosh or sipping a glass of wine. What a great venue!

Thanks to attendees, sponsors, and auction item donors, the WNA was able to net just under \$5,500 from the night to be utilized for the rejuvenation of the gardens. Efforts will begin this winter to secure bids, analyze costs, and divide the project into stages able to be completed over multiple years. Depending on the outcome of the bidding/planning process, phase 1 planting could begin as early as this spring.

The event was such a great success that there are plans to make it an annual event. We are tentatively identifying September 14, 2017 for the 2nd annual Gala For The Gardens. Too Much Waterbury?

Can there be such a thing as too much Waterbury? Apparently some folks thought so back in 1930. According to a Des Moines Tribune article from February 27, 1930 titled: Street Name Change Urged." The article states:

"The elimination of the confusion which it is claimed arises out of a multiplicity of Waterbury roads was urged upon the city council Thursday. A petition signed by seventy-five residents of the vicinity of Fifty-sixth street and Waterbury road urging action was presented to the council.

The situation has been brought to the council a number of times in recent years. The petitioners claim that the duplication of street names causes endless confusion for firemen, messengers, visitors, and others, as well as the residents of the district.

The petition recommended that...Waterbury road signs be removed from the street two blocks south of Waterbury road proper...

A new name would then have to be selected for the ...thoroughfare, thus reducing the confusion resulting from North Waterbury road, South Waterbury road and Waterbury circle.

South Waterbury road residents will be given opportunity to make their suggestions before action is taken."

I guess this explains why we haven't seen any messengers in the neighborhood lately.



One of the big ongoing projects for the association is the upkeep and maintenance of the gardens in our neighborhood. We are responsible for maintaining the primary garden at Polk & Ingersoll as well as the smaller bed at 56th & Waterbury Circle. Every year, we hold cleanups in the spring and fall to keep these areas looking their best. The help we receive from volunteers is critical to this endeavor and we would like to encourage residents to participate when we send out the sign up notification. It only requires 1-2 hours on a Saturday morning and makes such a big difference to the appearance of our neighborhood. The spring cleanup is scheduled for Saturday, April 22nd at 9am. So be sure to check your emails. This year, we would like to do some serious work and replanting in the garden at 56th & Waterbury Circle so some additional help will definitely be appreciated.

The 2016 fall cleanup was held on Saturday November 12th and we had 12 volunteers plus family members. A special thanks go out to Alice Peterson, the Stalvey family, Steve Balderson, the DeLancy family, Bill Nassif, the Dagitz family and Debra Kane In addition to the usual leaf raking and trimming, several hundred new daffodil bulbs were planted in the Polk & Ingersoll garden. These bulbs were a gift from Bill & Joan Scherle and will greatly enhance the beauty of the area in the early spring. Earlier in the fall, Bill also donated a large number of hostas which were planted in the same area by volunteers Dave Johnson and Tom McBride, who also donated plants for this endeavor.
