Waterbury Gardens to be Rejuvenated



As was reported in the last newsletter, the Waterbury Neighborhood Garden between Polk Blvd and 48th St is undergoing rejuvenation. Last winter, a new comprehensive plan was created to address the deterioration that has occurred over the past few years. The objectives of this plan are to add hardier plant material, simplify the design so there is less maintenance and to provide more color. Several areas of the plan have been left open as we hope to fill these spots with donated plants from members of the neighborhood. Also, we would like to repair the

gateway light, add a new structure to hide the electrical utility, and add berms to give the space some contour.

The first step of the master plan was taken this past summer as a number of neighborhood volunteers worked together to clear the area of dead, dying and overgrown plants. This was no small effort, as four trailer loads of brush were removed. In its place, the Board has planted 30 Viburnum shrubs and dozens of day lilies. Hydrangeas and redbuds have also been placed. Mulch was spread and weed control was applied. Boulders were donated by a Waterbury resident and added to the landscaped area.

2018 should witness the final phase of the rejuvenation. Thanks to the efforts and influence of Councilwoman Christine Hensley, the Association has secured a matching grant for the project from Polk County. This money will allow the Board to install a sprinkler system, add berms/structures and add several new varieties of perennials. A big thank you to Supervisors, Angela Connolly and John Mauro for their support, and to Lisa Moody-Tunks for helping with the logistics of the grant application.

This was a very challenging year for maintaining the garden. Hot weather and a prolonged drought made it necessary to water the annuals planted in the spring on a daily basis. Weed control is never easy and will remain a challenge with the new lay-out.

Our neighborhood is blessed with some of the finest private gardens in the city. The neighborhoods groomed lawns and flowerbeds are the envy of everyone who visits. We all are aware of the effort required to maintain our own property. The effort required to maintain the neighborhood garden is no less. To this point the Board has been able to personally answer the challenges posed by Mother Nature. However, if the rejuvenation plan is to succeed...if we are able to make the neighborhood garden vigorous again, it is going to take a pool of volunteers. We need your help. In the spring we will send out a call for volunteers for spring clean up, planting, spreading mulch and light landscaping. Please consider contributing a bit of your time. Students, scouts, and organizations that need service hours – have we got an opportunity for you!

If you would like to volunteer, simply check the appropriate box on your membership form and then watch your email for customized volunteer opportunities from one of our board members. We will also again utilize SignUpGenius for larger volunteer efforts. 

Des Moines Tribune April 22, 1930



THE COMMUNITY DID WIN THE AWARD THREE YEARS IN A ROW AND TODAY THE STONE STILL BE SEEN AT THE INTERSECTION **56TH** WATERBURY TREET CIRCLE. BEEN TIPPED OVER AND WENT UNNOTICED 1992 REDISCOVERED FORMER WATERRURY RESIDENT ELLEN HARVEY.

Waterbury Circle has been awarded the trophy for responding most fully in the "clean up, paint up" campaign of the Junior Chamber of Commerce Ray E. Harmon, secretary announced Tuesday.

This is the second consecutive year that community has won the award – a large rock. A community must win it three years in succession before it may keep it permanently.

Judges were Mrs. I.H. Tomlinson, collector of United States customs for the port of Des Moines, Mrs. Charles Pierce, president of the Des Moines Women's Club, and Mrs. J. S. Garlock, president of the Priscilla Club.


Seven communities were judged. Points considered were community spirit rather than money spent, conservation of property, effort and time.


Others entered were the Lincoln Heights Improvement League, Windsor Improvement League, University Place Improvement League, Linden Heights Neighborhood Club, Urbandale Booster Club, and the Birchwood Community.

According to Harman, the Waterbury Circle Community Club Inc. was responsible for the work done in that section. He said that if a vacant lot is not cared for in the district, members of the club turn out and clean it up as a community project.

"The judges reported that in no other section of Des Moines is there as much community spirit as in Waterbury Circle: he added.
