

Fall Tree Planting

the tunnel From of sycamores lining Polk Boulevard to the arches of oaks over our gardens and sidewalks, Waterbury's tree canopy is part of what makes our neighborhood feel so special. Last year's derecho damaged many local trees, several over a century old. If you're looking to replant this fall, here is some information from Iowa State University Extension:

Most container-grown and balled and burlapped deciduous trees and shrubs sold at garden centers are excellent candidates for fall planting. Notable tree



species that can be successfully planted in the fall include maple, buckeye or horsechestnut, alder, catalpa, hackberry, hawthorn, ash, honeylocust, Kentucky coffeetree, crabapple, Amur corktree, spruce, pine, sycamore, linden, and elm. Most deciduous shrubs are easily planted in fall; however, broad-leaved evergreens like rhododendron and narrow-leaved evergreens like yew prefer to be planted in the spring.

Fall planting (mid-August to mid-October) takes advantage of favorable soil temperatures and moisture conditions that promote the root growth needed to sustain plants through their critical first year in the landscape. Unfortunately, our midwestern climate is unpredictable, and even the toughest plants may die if fall or early winter weather is severe or erratic. But if healthy, vigorous plants are chosen, if proper post-planting care is given, and if slow-to-establish species are avoided, fall planting of trees and shrubs can be as successful as spring planting. 




FROM THE PAST

Country Club Knolls Development

Over the next several issues, we'll take a look at the history of individual housing developments throughout the Waterbury area.


Country Club Knolls is the largest development in size and number of houses in the Waterbury neighborhood. It was the site of the second Des Moines Country Club prior to being developed in 1925.



The original Des Moines Country Club started in 1897 and was located at the intersection of Ingersoll Avenue and Polk Boulevard on land owned by J.S. Polk. The Country Club in 1903 turned the land back over to Polk after they secured a 20-year lease on what would eventually become Country Club Knolls. The land was leased from brothers J.K. & W.H. Gilcrest. The brothers had moved from Ohio to Iowa in 1856 and started the Gilcrest Lumber Company. This company would later merge with the Jewett Lumber Company and become known as Gilcrest/Jewett Lumber Company today.

The new 18-hole course was designed in 1904. A new clubhouse opened in 1906 on 49th Street near the southwest corner of Harwood Drive. Renda Lutz reported in a 2002 Register article:

A large wraparound veranda offered wonderful views. The interior was trimmed in antique oak and filled with leather upholstery. There were billiard rooms and parlors. The third floor offered guest rooms and access to a rooftop walkway. Locker rooms and a bowling alley were in the basement. Des Moines Golf and Country Club was the site of many tournaments and social events... Archery, baseball, trapshooting and cards also were offered at the club.



The club's lease was set to expire in 1923. To relocate the Des Moines Golf and Country Club in October 1922, obtained 147 acres in West Des Moines from the Ashworth family off White Pole Road, now known as Ashworth Road. Dowling High School is currently located on a portion of the old golf course.

In December 1923, Burt German and 20 businessmen formed the Country Club Knolls Investment Company. They reportedly paid \$500,000 to the J.K & W. H. Gilcrest company for the land to start the residential development.

Burt German (1873-1956) was prominent Des Moines builder and realtor. As a young man German was the third head football coach for the Iowa State University (1894-1898). In 1917, just prior to the Country Club Knolls project he developed the Forestdale residential project. Forestdale is north and east of the intersection of Forest Avenue and 41st Street and is known for its curvilinear layout

When Burt German passed away in 1956 the Register published this editorial:


Burt German, a Good Citizen. Burt German, who died at the age of 83 the other day, was one of the best known citizens of Des Moines, as a real estate dealer and as, an all-around worker for community betterment. Mr. German was active in the campaign to bring city manager government to Des Moines. He also was one of the leaders of the Des Moines Downtown Kiwanis Club in promoting the annual Cerebral Palsy Benefit football game. As a real estate man, Mr. German developed 20 Des Moines sub-divisions. He was chairman of the real estate board's postwar committee. Burt German was well-known as an athlete. In his younger days and played football for both the State University of Iowa and Iowa State College. He was a strong supporter of Iowa State College football teams and frequently accompanied the team on out-of-town games. Most of all, Burt German was known as a friendly, good-hearted citizen of Des Moines. He will be missed. He developed 20 Des Moines subdivisions; was chairman of the Real Estate Board's postwar committee; and he perpetuated his name in Germania drive and the name of his birthplace in Maguoketa drive two of his subdivisions. Mr. German was born in Maquoketa, Apr. 19, 1873.

By early 1925 marketing of the new residential subdivision had begun. Below is some of the text used in promoting the development:

The opening of Country Club Knolls early in June will mark a real epoch in the history of Des Moines. It marks the beginning of a newer, finer type of residence section in this city. It witnesses the passing of one of the historic beauty spots of the. west end. For years this great tract of 80 acres has been one of the beautiful show places of the city. Its gently rolling hills, its stately trees, its exquisite surroundings have set it apart from all other sections. Nature never endowed an equal area more richly. Now it is to become a magnificent residence section.

Richly endowed by nature, Country Club Knolls was readymade years ago, as- a perfect site for wonderful homes. It stands at the crest of west Des Moines. Its gently rolling swells are high above the city. They are covered with hundredyear-old oaks and elms. They are carpeted with turf that was carefully prepared for years for one of the city's best golf courses. All around Country Club Knolls lie the finest residence sections of the city. It is the one tract left untouched in this center of magnificent homes. When it is gone the last of the beautiful ground, available in the west end will be gone forever. And nowhere else in the city are the conveniences for living so perfectly combined. To the south lies Country Club Boulevard with its splendid mansions. To the north is beautiful Waveland Park and the famous Waveland golf course. To the east is Polk Boulevard, Gil Mar Park, Roosevelt High school and Hubbell school. To the west are great woods and open country for hiking and picnics. The Ingersoll carline is just one block south and beautiful Greenwood Park two blocks south.

Below is a drawing of the first planned house in Country Club Knolls that was expected to start construction in October 1925 and a 1956 aerial photo showing the Waveland Golf Course next to Country Club Knolls prior to the freeway.
